Ulysses is a novel by the Irish author James Joyce, first serialised in parts in the American journal *The Little Review* from March 1918 to December 1920, then published in its entirety by Sylvia Beach on 2 February 1922, in Paris. One of the most important works of Modernist literature, it has been called "a demonstration and summation of the entire movement". *Ulysses* chronicles the passage of Leopold Bloom through Dublin during an ordinary day, 16 June 1904 (the day of Joyce's first date with his future wife, Nora Barnacle). The title alludes to Odysseus (Latinised into *Ulysses*), the hero of Homer's *Odyssey*, and establishes a series of parallels between characters and events in Homer's poem and Joyce's novel (e.g., the correspondence of Leopold Bloom to Odysseus, Molly Bloom to Penelope, and Stephen Dedalus to Telemachus). Joyce fans worldwide now celebrate 16 June as Bloomsday. *Ulysses* contains approximately 265,000 words from a lexicon of 30,030 words (including proper names, plurals and various verb tenses), divided into eighteen episodes. Since publication, the book attracted controversy and scrutiny, ranging from early obscenity trials to protracted textual "Joyce Wars." *Ulysses*' stream-of-consciousness technique, careful structuring, and experimental prose is full of puns, parodies, and allusions, as well as its rich

characterisations and broad humour, made the book a highly regarded novel in the Modernist pantheon. In 1999, the Modern Library ranked *Ulysses* first on its list of the 100 best English-language novels of the 20th century. Joyce divided *Ulysses* into eighteen chapters or "episodes". At first glance much of the book may appear unstructured and chaotic; Joyce once said that he had "put in so many enigmas and puzzles that it will keep the professors busy for centuries arguing over what I meant", which would earn the novel "immortality".[11]

The two schemata which Stuart Gilbert and Herbert Gorman released after publication to defend Joyce from the obscenity accusations made the links to the *Odyssey* clear, and also explained the work's internal structure. Every episode of *Ulysses* has a theme, technique, and correspondences between its characters and those of the *Odyssey*. The original text did not include these episode titles and the correspondences; instead, they originate from the Linati and Gilbert schema. Joyce referred to the episodes by their Homeric titles in his letters. He took the idiosyncratic rendering of some of the titles ȳ ȳ 'Nausikaa', the 'Telemachia' ȳ ȳ from Victor B é rard's two-volume *Les Ph é niciens et l ȳ Odyss é e* which he consulted in 1918 in the Zentralbibliothek Z ü rich.
